He has co-authored the secondary coursebook series Eyes Open and the adult series English Unlimited and Evolve, as well as the teachers' methodology handbooks Working with Images and Language Learning with Digital Video - all published by Cambridge. Most recently he has been working on the development of Evolve Digital, our new fully digital course, which launched with its first levels in January 2022. His main interests lie in intercultural and identity issues, visual literacy and fostering inclusivity in ELT.

- Abstract

Mobile phones need not be considered a distraction or a disruptive technology. This practical talk takes a positive approach to these ubiquitous devices and analyses the important role of mobile pedagogy in ELT today. We will focus both on in and outside class use and the need to promote digital literacy, a foundational layer of the Cambridge Life Competencies Framework.

- Abstract

Vocabulary is key to successful communication. A competent language user should demonstrate that they have both vocabulary range (a broad lexical repertoire) and vocabulary control (accurate and appropriate vocabulary use). In this session we will consider what vocabulary learners are expected to acquire at levels A2, B1 and B2. We will also share some activities and digital tools to help learners learn and expand their vocabulary as well as explore some of the ways vocabulary is assessed in Cambridge English Qualifications.

How to Build (a bit of) a Better World through English

- Lucie Cotterill

Lucie has been working at IH British School Reggio Calabria for 20 years, where she has taught a range of ages and levels, both onsite and in state schools, often with large class sizes. During her time at the school she has also been heavily involved in teacher training and development. Lucie also works part-time for IH World, as the Director of Studies Coordinator, and for the IH Online Teacher Training Institute, training academic managers on various aspects related to educational leadership. She has also developed and written course materials for primary and secondary, and volunteers as a committee member for the IATEFL's Inclusive Practices and Special Educational Needs SIG.

- Abstract

"21st-Century skills" and "Life skills" are rapidly becoming tired buzzwords, but there's no denying that the English classroom can be the ideal place to develop skills that students can benefit from in their present and future lives. In this talk, I will share my experience of working on courses which teach students life and work skills through English and suggest practical, low-preparation ideas for lessons and activities focussing on improving English through themes which are of increasing importance and interest to our students, such as sustainability, social responsibility, and emotional growth.

Exploring literature with a small "I"

- Abstract

Many teenagers are put off by the idea of doing literature because literary texts seem too difficult, too long, too remote or too old-fashioned. However, that response changes radically when we reassess the notion of "literary". Exploring literature "with a small l" simply means looking at any texts in which language is used expressively, playfully and imaginatively. This workshop looks at practical ways to engage and motivate teens by using such texts. It features tasks that get students to notice and work with language forms expressively, to explore new personal and imaginative worlds and to communicate authentically.

What is Dogme ELT? Some believe it is a groundbreaking approach which can change the way we teach and our students learn, while others see it as a maverick movement which has already lost its war. Or is it simply an occasional breath of fresh air and an escape from our classroom routine? We will try to answer these questions together by analysing the theoretical and practical advantages and disadvantages of Dogme ELT.

This workshop aims to provide teachers with ideas of activities that they can use in class with their students to practice language that they have learnt. The focus will be on activities that don't require a lot of preparation in advance and that can be adapted easily for any grammar or lexical target language.
